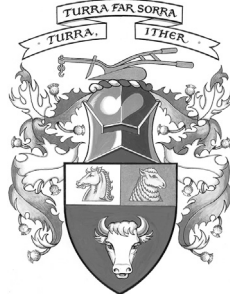

Secretary not later than **Saturday, 13th July, 2019.**

No entries will be accepted after that date

## RULES

1. The Exhibition is open to all comers.
2. All Exhibits must be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor in whose name the Entry is made and must have been worked since 1st August 2018.
3. **NO INTENDING EXHIBITOR MAY MAKE MORE THAN ONE ENTRY IN ANY CLASS, EXCEPT IN THE SHEPHERD'S CROOKS AND WALKING STICKS SECTION WHERE TWO ENTRIES PER CLASS IS ALLOWED.**
4. All Entries must be made to the Secretary of the Agricultural Association on the appropriate Entry Form, supplied for the purpose, which must reach the Secretary not later than SATURDAY, 13th JULY, 2019.
5. All Exhibits must be delivered to the Committee of Management within the Marquee in the Showfield from 7.00 a.m. until 9.30 a.m. on SUNDAY, 4th AUGUST. Where Exhibitors find it impossible or inconvenient to deliver Exhibits personally, such Exhibits will be carefully attended to if forwarded addressed to the Secretary of the Association to be in their hands not later than 9.30 a.m. on SUNDAY, 4th AUGUST, and will be returned to their respective owners after the Show.
6. While every care will be taken of Exhibits, such shall be entirely at the Exhibitor's own risk. The Association shall not be liable for any loss or damage Exhibits may sustain at the Show or in transit.
7. Judging shall commence at 10.00 a.m. on SUNDAY, 4th AUGUST. **EXHIBITS SHALL BE REMOVED BETWEEN 5.00 P.M. AND 5.30 P.M. ON MONDAY, 5TH AUGUST.**
8. In Points Competition a First Prize shall be awarded 4 Points; a Second Prize, 3 Points; a Third Prize, 2 Points; and a Fourth Prize, 1 Point.
9. Judges have the right to turn out contents of Jars, Bottles or other Containers, and to cut or break Cakes, etc.
10. In the interest of food hygiene, it is recommended that all food items exposed to the open air be discarded in waste bags provided by the Association, when collecting entries after the Show.
11. No Challenge of Entries, Classification of Exhibits, Awards of the Judges, or any other procedure shall be competent after 1 p.m. of the second day of the Show, and all Challenges, must be lodged with the Secretary in writing before that time along with £5 which shall be forfeited to the Association should it be the opinion of the Committee of Management that the protest was raised on unreasonable grounds. The Committee shall have the power to settle all disputed questions connected with the Exhibition, and against their decision there shall be no appeal.
12. Prize Money will be paid not later than 1st October, 2019.
13. Fifth and Sixth prize cards may be awarded but with no points or money value.

**PRESERVING HINT:** Preserves should be filled well allowing only a small air space. Wax disc placed while still warm. Cellophane covers to be taut. Chutneys to be fitted with a candle or beeswax disc and covered with cellophane or vinegar proof lid. Dressings should also have a vinegar proof lid. Jar and bottles to have a label with name, date and year of preserve and attach exhibitor label with a rubber band. Should not be displayed on disposable plates.

### TOFFEE APPLE JAM:

- 1 kilo/2¼lb Bramley apples
- 500g/1lb 2oz sugar
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 2 tbsp brandy

### INSTRUCTIONS

1. Peel and core apples and chop, toss in a bowl with lemon juice and set aside.
2. Stir 250g (8oz) sugar with 4 tablespoons water in heavy based pan till golden.
3. Add apples and remaining sugar and stir on low heat to dissolve.
4. Boil 10-15 minutes to soften apples and thicken.
5. Press through sieve with wooden spoon.
6. Return to pan and boil 1 more minute.
7. Remove from heat and add brandy.
8. Ladle into sterilised jars and pop on the lids. Leave overnight to let flavours develop.

3. All beeswax may be displayed in show boxes.
4. All frames of honey (Class 67) shall be submitted in a display box which shall be sealed to prevent access by bees. Attending members shall refuse to accept any entries in Class 67 that are not fully bee-tight. Entries shall be resealed after inspection by honey judge.

## TRAUMA TEDDY PATTERN

Use only NEW DK yarn (no fluffy yarn)

1 pair size 3.25mm knitting needles, head and paws (preferably fawn) yarn, scarf yarn (should be bright).

Stuffing – please only stuff teddy with NEW toy stuffing (or you can buy a NEW pillow for stuffing) MUST

MEET FIRE SAFETY BS5852. Foam rubber, tights etc. CANNOT BE USED!

Teddies should be NEUTRAL COLOURS SO CAN BE USED FOR EITHER A BOY OR GIRL.

Cast on 10 stitches main colour, Knit 10 rows

Continue in garter stitch for 26 rows in trouser colour. Make another leg in the same way.

Knit across all 20 stitches and work 16 rows. Change to jumper colour and knit 26 rows.

Change to paw colour for head and also change to stocking stitch. Knit for 5½ inches.

Change to jumper colour and knit 26 rows.

Continue remainder of Teddy in reverse order.

Stitch down the sides of the head. With jumper colour, pick up 9 stitches either side of the neck join (18 in all) and knit 16 rows. Change to main colour and knit 10 rows for paws. Copy on other side for other arm.

Sew up Teddy leaving opening in crotch.

Turn right side out and sew diagonal top corners for ears before stuffing.

Don't stuff too hard or the Teddy won't be cuddly.

After stuffing, run a thread through the knitting around the neck to draw it in.

Sew a happy face and for mouth use either stem stitch or back stitch.

SCARF:

Cast on 75 stitches. Knit 4 rows and cast off. Sew scarf on Teddy VERY SECURELY at the back of the neck, close to the jumper edge. Don't sew down at the front.

PLEASE MAKE SURE YOU SEW THE SCARF ON VERY TIGHTLY AND SEW UP THE TEDDY VERY SECURELY, MAKING SURE NO STUFFING CAN BE PULLED OUT.

ONLY SEWN ON EYES CAN BE ACCEPTED, MAKE SURE YOU KNOT ALL ENDS IN FOR SAFETY.

NO SAFETY EYES OR BUTTONS.

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## KNITTED BABY'S HAT PATTERN

Materials - 1 ball wool (NOT WHITE)

Size 8 (4mm) needles and 1 set 6 (5mm) needles

Abbreviations: K = knit, P = purl, K2tog = knit two stitches together

Gauge - 20 stitches = 4 inches on large needles in stocking stitch (i.e. 1 row knit, 1 row purl)

Cuff - with smaller needles cast on 48 stitches

Work knit 1, purl 1 till you have 1½ inches

Change to larger needles. Knit one row (right side), purl one row until the total from cast on measures 5 inches

End with a purl row, (wrong side)

Shape top -

Row 1: K2tog, K2 till end of row, you now have 36 stitches

Row 2: Purl

Row 3: K2tog, K2 till end of row, you now have 27 stitches

Row 4: Purl

Row 5: K2tog, K1 till end of row, you now have 18 stitches

Row 6: Purl

Row 7: K2tog till end of row, you now have 9 stitches

Cut wool leaving a long thread. Thread into wool needle and draw through remaining stitches on knitting needle.

Draw tight and fasten securely

Sew up seam

Turn up cuff

## CROCHETED OCTOPUS PATTERN

### MATERIALS:

- **Crochet hook** size 3 or 3.5 millimetre
- **Cotton yarn** (100 percent cotton only), cotton 8/4 or 8/8 (the reason for mentioning more options is that tightness is individual and to emphasize that it is perfectly fine to use leftover yarn).
- **Stuffing:** Fibre filling – has to be washable at 60 degrees Celsius
- **Tapestry needle**

### Abbreviations:

Dc – double crochet  
Htc – half treble crochet  
Tc – treble crochet  
St – stitch  
Sts - stitches  
Ch – chain  
Tg – together  
Sl st – slip stitch  
Yoh – yarn over hook

### Body: working in continuous rounds:

1st round: 6 dc in a magic loop  
2nd round: 2 dc in each st (12 sts in total)  
3rd round: 2 dc in every other st, 1 dc in the other sts (18 sts in total)  
4th round: 2 dc in every 3rd st, 1 dc in all other sts (24 sts)  
5th round: 2 dc in every 4th st, 1 dc in all other sts (30 sts)  
6th round: 2 dc in every 5th st, 1 dc in all other stitches (36 sts)  
7th – 14th round: 1 dc in each st (36 sts each round)  
15th round: \*1 dc in the first 4 st, dc tg 5th and 6th st\* repeat 5 times (30 sts remaining)  
16th – 17th round: 1 dc in each st (30 sts)  
18th round: \*1 dc in each of 3 sts, dc tg 4th and 5th st\* repeat 5 times (24 sts remaining)  
19th-20th round: 1 dc in each st (24 sts)  
21st round: \*1 dc in first 2 sts, dc tg 3rd and 4th st\* repeat 5 times (18 sts remaining)  
22nd round: 1 dc in each st (18 sts)  
23rd round: \*1 dc in first 7 sts, dc tg 8th and 9th st \* repeat once (16 sts remaining)  
24th round: 1 dc in each st (16 sts)  
25th round: this is where the tentacles start: \*1 dc, chain 50, turn, 2 or 3 dc in each chain (49 chains), 1 dc in next st of the body\* repeat 7 times, making 8 tentacles. End with a sl st, cut yarn and sew in the end.  
The tentacles must not be longer than 22 centimetres when drawn out the longest they can, as they may be a choking hazard if longer.

### Bottom:

1st round: 5 dc in a magic ring  
2nd round: 2 dc in each stitch (10 stitches)  
3rd round: 2 dc in every other stitch, 1 dc in the other stitches (15 stitches) End with a sl st, cut yarn and sew in the end.

### Eyes:

Crochet in single white yarn, make 2 (or embroider the eyes as you like)  
1st round: 4 dc in a magic loop  
2nd round: 2 dc in each st (8 sts)  
3rd round: 2 dc in every other st, 1 dc in the other (12 sts)  
End with a sl st, cut yarn and sew in ends.  
Embroider pupils with black thread.

### Assembling the Octopus:

Stuff the body and sew the bottom on. Sew on the eyes (or embroider them on) and embroider a mouth using your preferred stitches.
