RULES

1. The Exhibition is open to all comers.
2. All Exhibits must be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor in whose name the Entry is made and must have been worked since 1st August 2022.
3. **NO INTENDING EXHIBITOR MAY MAKE MORE THAN ONE ENTRY IN ANY CLASS, EXCEPT IN THE SHEPHERD'S CROOKS AND WALKING STICKS SECTION WHERE TWO ENTRIES PER CLASS IS ALLOWED.**
4. All Entries must be made to the Secretary of the Agricultural Association on the appropriate Entry Form, supplied for the purpose, which must reach the Secretary not later than **SATURDAY 8th JULY 2023.**
5. All Exhibits must be delivered to the Committee of Management within the Marquee in the Showfield from 7.00 a.m. until 9.30 a.m. on **SUNDAY 30th JULY 2023.** Where Exhibitors find it impossible or inconvenient to deliver Exhibits personally, such Exhibits will be carefully attended to if forwarded addressed to the Secretary of the Association to be in their hands not later than 9.30 a.m. on **SUNDAY 30th JULY 2023,** and will be returned to their respective owners after the show.
6. While every care will be taken of Exhibits, such shall be entirely at the Exhibitor's own risk. The Association shall not be liable for any loss or damage Exhibits may sustain at the Show or in transit.
7. Judging shall commence at 10.00 a.m. on **SUNDAY 30th JULY 2023. EXHIBITS SHALL BE REMOVED BETWEEN 5.00 P.M. AND 5.30 P.M. ON MONDAY 31ST JULY 2023.**
8. In Points Competition a First Prize shall be awarded 4 Points; a Second Prize, 3 Points; a Third Prize, 2 Points; and a Fourth Prize, 1 Point.
9. Judges have the right to turn out contents of Jars, Bottles or other Containers, and to cut or break Cakes, etc.
10. In the interest of food hygiene, it is recommended that all food items exposed to the open air be discarded in waste bags provided by the Association, when collecting entries after the Show.
11. **No Challenge of Entries, Classification of Exhibits, Awards of the Judges, or any other procedure shall be competent after 1 p.m. of the second day of the Show, and all Challenges, must be lodged with the Secretary in writing before that time along with £5 which shall be forfeited to the Association should it be the opinion of the Committee of Management that the protest was raised on unreasonable grounds. The Committee shall have the power to settle all disputed questions connected with the Exhibition, and against their decision there shall be no appeal.**
12. Prize Money will be paid not later than **1st October 2023.**
13. Fifth and Sixth prize cards may be awarded but with no points or money value.

TRAUMA TEDDY PATTERN

MATERIALS: Use only NEW DK yarn – NO FLUFFY YARN & TEDDIES SHOULD BE IN NEUTRAL COLOURS SO CAN BE USED FOR EITHER A BOY OR A GIRL. Head and Paws preferably fawn. Scarf Yarn should be bright colour.

STUFFING: Please only stuff teddy with NEW toy stuffing (or you can buy a NEW pillow for stuffing) - MUST MEET FIRE SAFETY BS5852. Foam rubber, tights etc. **CANNOT BE USED!**

1 pair size 3.25mm knitting needles

Cast on 10 stitches main colour, Knit 10 rows. Continue in garter stitch for 26 rows in trouser colour. Make another leg in the same way.

Knit across all 20 stitches and work 16 rows. Change to jumper colour and knit 26 rows.

Change to paw colour for head and change to stocking stitch. Knit for 5½ inches.

Change to jumper colour and knit 26 rows. Continue remainder of Teddy in reverse order.

Stitch down the sides of the head.

With jumper colour, pick up 9 stitches either side of the neck join (18 in all) and knit 16 rows. Change to main colour and knit 10 rows for paws. Copy on other side for other arm.

Sew up Teddy leaving opening in crotch. Turn right side out and sew diagonal top corners for ears before stuffing. Don't stuff too hard or the Teddy won't be cuddly. After stuffing, run a thread through the knitting around the neck to draw it in. Sew a happy face and for mouth use either stem stitch or back stitch.

SCARF: Cast on 75 stitches. Knit 4 rows and cast off. Sew scarf on Teddy VERY SECURELY at the back of the neck, close to the jumper edge. Don't sew down at the front.

PLEASE MAKE SURE YOU SEW THE SCARF ON VERY TIGHTLY AND SEW UP THE TEDDY VERY SECURELY, MAKING SURE NO STUFFING CAN BE PULLED OUT. ONLY SEWN ON EYES CAN BE ACCEPTED, MAKE SURE YOU KNOT ALL ENDS IN FOR SAFETY. NO SAFETY EYES OR BUTTONS.

KNITTED BABY'S HAT PATTERN

MATERIALS: 1 ball wool (NOT WHITE). Size 8 (4mm) needles and 1 set 6 (5mm) needles

ABBREVIATIONS: K = knit, P = purl, K2tog = knit two stitches together

GAUGE: 20 stitches = 4 inches on large needles in stocking stitch (i.e., 1 row knit, 1 row purl)

Cuff - with smaller needles cast on 48 stitches Work knit 1, purl 1 till you have 1½ inches

Change to larger needles. Knit one row (right side), purl one row until the total from cast on measures 5 inches.

End with a purl row, (wrong side)

Shape top: Row 1: K2tog, K2 till end of row, you now have 36 stitches

Row 2: Purl

Row 3: K2tog, K2 till end of row, you now have 27 stitches

Row 4: Purl

Row 5: K2tog, K1 till end of row, you now have 18 stitches

Row 6: Purl

Row 7: K2tog till end of row, you now have 9 stitches

Cut wool leaving a long thread. Thread into wool needle and draw through remaining stitches on knitting needle.

Draw tight and fasten securely. Sew up seam. Turn up cuff

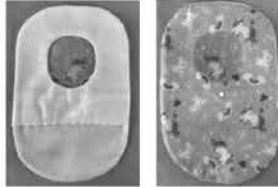
STOMA BAG COVER

Soft Cotton is ideal for Stoma Bag Covers

Using **pattern pieces** cut out Fabric
(all cut on the fold) 1 X A; 2 X B; 1 X C

Fold "C" piece in half top to bottom with right side on the outside. Top stitch along the fold.

Sew Circle on "B" pieces.

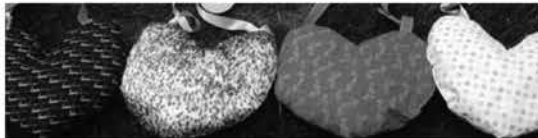


With right sides facing, sew both sides of "B" piece together, around the circle, approximately 6mm from the edge. Clip around the circle without cutting stitches. Turn inside out, through the hole so right sides out. Press. Top stitch all around the circle close to the edge.

Hem bottom of "B" piece. Fold each bottom edge approximately 1cm inside and sew across close to edge.

Assemble and sew. On work surface, place "A" piece right side up, then "B" piece right side down, then "C" piece right side down. Pin pieces together. Sew all the way around, 6mm from edge. Trim, turn right way round, top stitch round the edge.

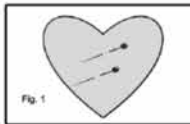
ANGEL PILLOW



MATERIALS: ½ yard of fabric for front and back
Polyester fibrefill
Optional for Strap - 2 pieces of grosgrain ribbon (30 inches each)

Use pattern attached or alternatively it can be downloaded from www.angelpillow.org

Join Part "A" & "B" of pattern together. Then cut pattern on a folded piece of paper where indicated by "fold" line.



Fold ½ yard of fabric in half, right sides together. Position pattern in centre of fabric and pin in place (Fig. 1) and cut.

Pin ribbon to back piece as directed with right side facing up.



Sew with ½" seam allowance along edge of fabric.

Clip seam allowance around the entire shape about every inch or so. Turn right side out and stuff with small pieces of polyester fibrefill. Hand or machine stitch the gap closed.
