- All exhibits must be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor in whose name the entry is made and must have been worked since 1ST AUGUST 2023.
- No Exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any class, except in the Shepherd's Crooks & Walking Sticks section, where two entries per class are allowed.
- 4. All Entries must be made online at www.turriffshow.org or on the enclosed Entry Form. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE CLOSING DATE OF SATURDAY 29TH JUNE 2024. (SATURDAY 6TH JULY 2024 FOR FLOWER ARRANGEMENT).
- 5. All Exhibits must be delivered to the Industrial Committee within the Industrial Marquee in the Showfield from 7.00 a.m. until 9.30 a.m. on SUNDAY 4TH AUGUST 2024. Where Exhibitors find it impossible to deliver Exhibits personally, such Exhibits will be carefully attended to if forwarded addressed to the Secretary of the Association to be in their hands not later than 5 p.m. on SATURDAY 3RD AUGUST 2024.
- 6. While every care will be taken of Exhibits, such shall be entirely at the Exhibitor's own risk. The Association shall not be liable for any loss or damage Exhibits may sustain at the Show or in transit.
- 7. Judging shall commence at 10.00 a.m. on **SUNDAY 4TH AUGUST 2024.**
- Exhibits shall be removed between 5.00 p.m. and 5.45 p.m. on MONDAY 5TH
 AUGUST 2024. WE WILL NOT ALLOW VEHICLE ACCESS FOR COLLECTION OF
 EXHIBITS BEFORE 5PM ON MONDAY 5TH AUGUST 2024 IN THE INTEREST OF
 HEALTH AND SAFETY.
- 9. Any food items which have not been collected will be disposed of at 5.45pm.
- In Points Competition a First Prize shall be awarded 4 Points; a Second Prize, 3
 Points; a Third Prize, 2 Points; and a Fourth Prize, 1 Point.
- Judges have the right to turn out contents of Jars, Bottles or other Containers, and to cut or break Cakes. etc.
- In the interest of food hygiene, it is recommended that all food items exposed to the open air be discarded after the show in waste bags provided by the Association.
- 13. Fish & Chips Baby Jumper

Newborn babies, many suffering from Aids, are being called "Fish & Chip" babies because many are sent home from hospital wrapped in newspaper for warmth. In order to assist these tiny babies we are asking you to knit a small jumper which will be sent to Africa to keep little children warm. Average knitters can complete a jumper in an evening. It's an easy, guick pattern.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS

No pastels or white please, as these garments may never be washed. Bright and mixed colours are best or stripes. Knitted All In One

MATERIALS

Double Knitting yarn; Size 6 (5mm) needles (tight knitters); Size 7 (4.5mm) needles (loose knitters)

INSTRUCTIONS

Cast on 44 stitches. Work 18 rows in K2, P2 rib Work 30 rows in stocking stitch (1 row K, 1 row P) Cast on 12 stitches at beginning of next 2 rows and change to K2, P2 (for the sleeves)

Rib 22 more rows

Next Row: (for the neck) rib 21, cast off 26 sts. rib 21

Next Row: rib 21, cast on 26, rib 21

Work rows K2, P2

Cast off 12 sts at beginning of next 2 rows

Work 30 rows in stocking stitch

Work 18 rows K2. P2

Cast Off. Sew up side seams.



Bonding Squares

Bonding Squares are knitted in matching pairs. One square is placed with a premature baby and another is worn against the mum's skin, then the squares are swapped round every 12 hours or every time mum visits. Many Neonatal Units are now using them. They help with the bonding of a premature baby in an incubator and the baby's mum. The baby can smell mum's scent even when she isn't there or wasn't able to get him out of his incubator, and then when she goes home, she can still smell the baby's scent on the square, which is a big comfort. In addition, many mums find that it really helps with expressing breast milk. Keeping the scent of the baby close by triggers the hormones needed to produce and express milk, which is very important as breastfeeding can be difficult for mothers with premature babies.

Simple Bonding Square Pattern

MATERIALS

DK - approximately 16-18g 4mm Knitting Needles

TENSION

22sts = 10cm (4in)

ABBREVIATIONS

k knit S1 slip 1 stitch sts stitches

INSTRUCTIONS

Cast on 28 sts

Start with garter stitch border, k6 rows

7th row: S1. knit across row 8th Row: \$1, k4, purl to last 5sts, k5 Repeat the last 2 rows 11 times more







Complete with a garter stitch border – knit 7 rows Cast off knit wise.

Premature Baby Hat

MATERIALS

100g 4 ply yarn, 1 pair 3mm needles

ABBREVIATIONS

s slip stitch p purl k knit sts stitches k2tog knit 2 together C6F cable 6 front patt pattern psso pass slip stitch over

INSTRUCTIONS:

Using 3mm needles cast on 93 sts, work 15 rows of k1, p1 rib ending with a right side row

Rib 45, increase once in each of the next 3 stitches, rib 45 (96sts)

1st row: k44, p1, k6, p1, k44

2nd row: (k1, p3) 11 times, k1, p6, k1, (p3, k1) 11 times

3rd & 4th rows: As 1st & 2nd rows 5th row: k44, p1 C6F, p1, k44

6th row: As 2nd row

From 1^{st} to 6^{th} row forms the pattern. Keeping continuity of pattern as set continue until hat measures 10cm (4 inches) ending with ws row.

SHAPE CROWN:

1st row: k4, (k2, k2tog, k4) 5 times, p1, patt6, p1, (k4,s1, k1, psso, k2) 5 times, k4. 86sts

Work 3 rows

5th row: (k2, k2tog) once (k5, k2tog) 5 times, p1, patt6, p1, (s1, k1, psso, k5) 5 times, (s1, k1, psso,

k2) once. 74sts Work 3 rows

9th row: k3, (k1, k2tog, k3) 5 times, p1, patt6, p1, (k3,s1, k1, psso, k1) 5 times, k3. 64sts

Work 3 rows

13th row: (k1, k2tog) once (k3, k2tog) 5 times, p1, patt6, p1, (s1, k1, psso, k3) 5 times, (s1, k1, psso,

k1) once. 52sts

Work 3 rows

17th row: k2, (k2, k2tog) 5 times, p1, patt6, p1, (k2,s1, k1, psso) 5 times, k2. 42sts

Work 3 rows

21st row: (k2tog) once (k1, k2tog) 5 times, p1 (k2tog) 3 times, p1, (s1, k1, psso, k1) 5 times (s1, k1,

psso) once. 27sts

Break Yarn and thread through rem sts. Pull up tight and fasten off securely.

TO MAKE UP: Join back seam, reversing seam for turnback.

Stoma Bag Cover

Soft Cotton is ideal for Stoma Bag Covers

Using pattern pieces cut out Fabric (all cut on the fold) 1 X A; 2 X B; 1 X C

Fold "C" piece in half top to bottom with right side on the outside. Top stitch along the fold.

Sew Circle on "B" pieces.



With right sides facing, sew both sides of "B" piece together, around the circle, approximately 6mm from the edge. Clip around the circle without cutting stitches. Turn inside out, through the hole so right sides out. Press. Top stitch all around the circle close to the edge.

Hem bottom of "B" piece. Fold each bottom edge approximately 1cm inside and sew across close to edge.

Assemble and sew. On work surface, place "A" piece right side up, then "B" piece right side down, then "C" piece right side down. Pin pieces together. Sew all the way around, 6mm from edge. Trim, turn right way round, top stitch round the edge.

"Angel" Mastectomy Pillow






Materials: ½ yard of fabric for front and back

Polyester fibrefill

Optional for Strap - 2 pieces of grosgrain ribbon (30 inches

Join Part "A" & "B" of pattern together. Then cut pattern on a folded piece of paper where indicated

Fold ½ yard of fabric in half, right sides together. Position pattern in centre of fabric and pin in place (Fig. 1) and cut.

Pin ribbon to back piece as directed with right side facing up.

Sew with $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowance along edge of fabric.



Clip seam allowance around the entire shape about every inch or so. Turn right side out and stuff with small pieces of polyester fibrefill. Hand or machine stitch the gap closed.
