RULES

1. The Industrial Competition is open to all.
2. Exhibits must be the bona fide work of the Exhibitor in whose name the entry is made and must have been worked since **5TH AUGUST 2025**. The only exception is for any individual item previously entered in the Co-operative classes in 2025 (Sections 13, 15 & 16).
3. **Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit in any class, except in the Shepherd's Crooks & Walking Sticks section, where two entries per class are allowed.**
4. All Entries must be made online at www.turriffshow.org or on the enclosed Entry Form.
ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE CLOSING DATE OF SATURDAY 11TH JULY 2026.
FLORAL ART & HONEY ENTRIES CLOSING DATE OF SATURDAY 18TH JULY 2026
5. All Exhibits must be delivered to the Industrial Committee within the Industrial Marquee in the Showfield from 7.00 a.m. until 9.30 a.m. on **SUNDAY 2ND AUGUST 2026**. Where Exhibitors find it impossible to deliver Exhibits personally, such Exhibits will be carefully attended to if forwarded to the Association to be in their hands not later than 5 p.m. on **SATURDAY 1ST AUGUST 2026**.
6. While every care will be taken of Exhibits, such shall be entirely at the Exhibitor's own risk. The Association shall not be liable for any loss or damage Exhibits may sustain at the Show or in transit.
7. Judging shall commence at 10.00 a.m. on **SUNDAY 2ND AUGUST 2026**.
8. Exhibits shall be removed between 5.00 p.m. and 5.45 p.m. on **MONDAY 3RD AUGUST 2026**.
WE WILL NOT ALLOW VEHICLE ACCESS FOR COLLECTION OF EXHIBITS BEFORE 5PM ON MONDAY 3RD AUGUST 2026 IN THE INTEREST OF HEALTH AND SAFETY.
9. Any food items which have not been collected will be disposed of at 5.45pm.
10. In Points Competition a First Prize shall be awarded 4 Points; a Second Prize, 3 Points; a Third Prize, 2 Points; and a Fourth Prize, 1 Point.
11. Judges have the right to turn out contents of Jars, Bottles or other Containers, and to cut or break cakes, etc.
12. In the interest of food hygiene, it is recommended that all food items exposed to the open air be discarded after the show in waste bags provided by the Association.
13. **FOR SECTIONS 13, 15 & 16**
IN THE EVENT THAT MORE THAN ONE ITEM RECEIVES 10 POINTS, THE JUDGES WILL SELECT THE WINNER OF THE TROPHY FOR THE OUTSTANDING EXHIBITS AND THIS WILL BE INDICATED ON THE SCORE CARD WITH A GOLD STAR.
14. No Challenge of Entries, Classification of Exhibits, Awards of the Judges, or any other procedure shall be competent after 1 p.m. of the second day of the Show, and all Challenges, must be lodged with the Secretary in writing before that time along with £25 which shall be forfeited to the Association should it be the opinion of the Committee of Management that the protest was raised on unreasonable grounds. The Committee shall have the power to settle all disputed questions connected with the Exhibition, and against their decision there shall be no appeal.
15. Prize Money will be paid by Bank Transfer **NO LATER THAN 1ST OCTOBER 2026**. In the event of bank details not being provided to the Association prize money will be retained as a donation.
16. Fifth and Sixth prize cards may be awarded but with no points or money value.

Preserves should be filled well allowing only a small air space. Wax disc placed while still warm. Cellophane covers to be taut. Chutneys to be made at least three months ahead of judging and should be fitted with a candle or beeswax disc and covered with cellophane or vinegar proof lid. Dressings should also have a vinegar proof lid. Should not be displayed on disposable plates.

BONDING SQUARES (Class 97)

Bonding Squares are knitted in matching pairs. One square is placed with a premature baby and another is worn against the mum's skin, then the squares are swapped round every 12 hours or every time mum visits. Many Neonatal Units are now using them. They help with the bonding of a premature baby in an incubator and the baby's mum. The baby can smell mum's scent even when she isn't there or wasn't able to get baby out of their incubator, and then when she goes home, she can still smell the baby's scent on the square, which is a big comfort. In addition, many mums find that it really helps with expressing breast milk. Keeping the scent of the baby close by triggers the hormones needed to produce and express milk, which is very important as breastfeeding can be difficult for mothers with premature babies.

MATERIALS - DK – approximately 16-18g; 4mm Knitting Needles

TENSION - 22sts = 10cm (4in)

ABBREVIATIONS k knit S1 slip 1 stitch sts stitches

INSTRUCTIONS

Cast on 28 sts; Start with garter stitch border, k6 rows

7th row: S1, knit across row

8th Row: S1, k4, purl to last 5sts, k5

Repeat the last 2 rows 11 times more

Complete with a garter stitch border – knit 7 rows

Cast off knit wise.

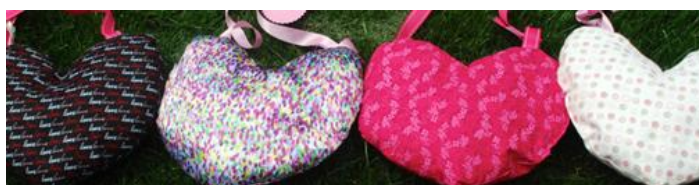


“ANGEL” MASTECTOMY PILLOW (Class109)

Mastectomy Pillows are donated to those that have undergone any type of breast surgery.

Each month Friends of Anchor distribute 60+ mastectomy pillows to those who have undergone various procedures.

As there is a great demand for pillows, we would welcome any additional donations made that are not being entered into the class for judging.



Materials: ½ yard of fabric for front and back;

Polyester fibrefill;

Optional for Strap - 2 pieces of grosgrain ribbon (30 inches each)

Use pattern attached or alternatively it can be downloaded from www.angelpillow.org

Join Part “A” & “B” of pattern together. Then cut pattern on a folded piece of paper where indicated by “fold” line.

Fold ½ yard of fabric in half, right sides together. Position pattern in centre of fabric and pin in place (Fig. 1) and cut.

Pin ribbon to back piece as directed with right side facing up.

Sew with ½” seam allowance along edge of fabric.

Clip seam allowance around the entire shape about every inch or so. Turn right side out and stuff with small pieces of polyester fibrefill. Hand or machine stitch the gap closed.

KNITTED BREASTS (Class 96)

An Aid to Teaching Breast Feeding - Visual Aids for use in ante-natal and post-natal discussion and classes.

MATERIALS - Small amounts of DK in colours A & B; Washable Stuffing; 3¼ mm (UK 10) Knitting Needles

TENSION - 25sts and 34 rows to 10cm (4in) measured over stocking stitch. It is essential to obtain the correct tension in yarn used and a small test piece should be worked.

ABBREVIATIONS

Alt Alternative p purl k knit rem remaining st(s) stitch(es) tog together

st st stocking stitch (1 row k, 1 row p) M1 (make 1 st) pick up horizontal loop lying before next st & work into back of it

Note: Instructions in round brackets () should be repeated as stated after the brackets

SMALL BREAST

Base: *using colour A, cast on 6 sts

1st and every alt row to 13th row: purl

2nd row: k1, (M1,k1) 5 times. 11 sts

4th row: k1, (M1,k1) 10 times. 21 sts

6th row: k2, (M1,k1,M1, k3) 4 times, M1, k1, M1, k2. 31 sts

8th row: k3, (M1,k1,M1, k5) 4 times, M1, k1, M1, k3. 41 sts

10th row: k4, (M1,k1,M1, k7) 4 times, M1, k1, M1, k4. 51 sts

12th row: k5, (M1,k1,M1, k9) 4 times, M1, k1, M1, k5. 61 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

24th row: k4, (k2tog, k7) 6 times, k2 tog, k4. 57 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

28th row: k3, (k2tog, k6) 6 times, k2 tog, k4. 50 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

Break off colour A. Join in colour B.

32nd row: k3, (k2tog, k5) 6 times, k2tog, k3. 43 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

36th row: k2, (k2tog, k4) 6 times, k2tog, k3. 36 sts

37th row: purl

38th row: k2, (k2tog, k3) 6 times, k2tog, k2. 29 sts

32nd row: k5, (k2tog, k7) 7 times, k2tog, k5. 67 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

36th row: k5, (k2tog, k6) 7 times, k2tog, k4. 59 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

40th row: k4, (k2tog, k5) 7 times, k2tog, k4. 51 sts

Work 3 rows in st st starting purl

44th row: (k4, k2tog) 8 times, k3. 43 sts

45th row: purl

18th row: k8, (M1, k1, M1, k15)4 times, M1, k1, M1, k8.
91sts

19th row: purl

20th row: knit

21st row: knit

46th row: (k3, k2tog) 8 times, k3. 35 sts

47th row: purl

Break off Colour A, Join in Colour B.

48th row: k3, (k2tog, k2) 8 times. 27 sts

Work 3 rows in st st

Break yarn, thread through rem sts, draw up firmly and fasten off. Finish as given for small breast.

SANDS MEMORY BOX BLANKET (Class 98)

Please note that Sands can only accept white blankets. If you are intending to make a blanket with the lace edging, then please knit the basic blanket no larger than a 20-inch square.

Easy Baby Blanket with Lace Option

This lace border makes the easy blanket very special, and you can use any white wool and needles to suit for the border, to give a soft drape. However, you can knit to the basic pattern, which knits to approx. a 24" square. It will always come square.

BASIC BLANKET

200gm of Double-Knit Wool and 4 mm/UK size 8/US size 6 needles.

Tie your yarn to your needle

Row 1: - KFB (increase by knitting into the front and back of the same stitch), 2 stitches on needle

Row 2: - K1, M1, 3 stitches on needle.

Row 3: - K1, M1, K1 4 stitches on needle.

Row 4: - K1, M1, K2

Continue to knit, ALWAYS knit the first stitch then increase the 2nd stitch of each row. Continue until you have almost come to the end of the 100gm ball. Knit 1 row plain.

Next row: - K1, K2TOG, Knit to end of row. Continue this way, always knit the 1st stitch then decrease into the next stitch by knitting 2 together until 1 stitch remains, cast off. You should now have a neat square.



LACE EDGING

Using Double Knit and size 8 (UK) needles Cast on 8 stitches

Row 1 (Wrong side) Slip 1, Knit 1, (Yarn fwd knit 2 tog) twice, Yarn fwd, Knit 2 (9 sts) Rows 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10. Slip 1 knit to the end.

Row 3. Slip 1, knit 2 (yarn fwd knit 2 tog) twice. Yarn fwd Knit 2 (10 sts)

Row 5. Slip 1, knit 3 (yarn fwd knit 2 tog) twice. Yarn fwd Knit 2 (11 sts)

Row 7. Slip 1, knit 4 (yarn fwd knit 2 tog) twice. Yarn fwd Knit 2 (12 sts) Row 9. Cast off 4 sts. Knit to the end (8 sts)

These 10 rows form the pattern. Continue in pattern until it is long enough to fit all around. Sew onto the blanket.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SYRINGE DRIVER BAG (Class 108)

1. First cut two pieces of different fabric 60cm x 25cm (24"x10"). It is best to choose a washable fabric with a small print.

2. Then cut a long piece 140cm x 12cm (55" x 5") which will make up the strap. If you wish to make a few bags then you can alter the length of this strap by about 10cm (4") for taller or smaller people.

3. Fold in the edges about 2cm (3/4") on all sides and iron. Fold in half down the length so that the right side is on the outside and it forms a strap about 5cm (2") wide.

4. Sew the open edges across the top, down the length and at the bottom of the strap. Put to one side.

5. With right sides together sew down the length, across one width and up the other length of the 60cm x 25cm (24" x 10") pieces of fabric to form a bag. (like a pillowcase) Leave a 2cm (3/4") seam around the edge.

6. Turn the material the right way round. You may wish to iron it at this stage. This will be about 58cm x 22cm. (23" x 8 1/4") When folded in half this forms the bag. The McKinley T34 syringe driver including its clear plastic case is 22cm x 10 1/2 cm x 4cm (8 5/8" x 4 1/4 x 1 1/2)

7. Fold the open edge in and sew across the top creating one long piece of fabric, with all seams on the inside. Fold this in half. This will form your bag. The bag will be approx. 27cm long and 22cm wide. (11" x 9")

8. The sides of your bag will now be made up of four layers. Sew from the fold to the opening on each side of the bag 1cm in from the edge. The contrast on the inside shows on the outside like 'piping'.

9. Sew the strap onto the sides of the bag, opening up the 'piping'. Please make sure that the strap is not twisted when sewing it on to the other side. (Easily done!!)



NOTE: If you choose to use fabric that has a 'right way up' you will need to cut it 4cm (1 1/2") longer then cut it in half. Then sew it together so that when it folds both sides are the right way up. This will form an extra seam at the base of the bag.

TUTTI FRUTTI BEARS – CROCHET PATTERN (Class 93)

Pattern kindly supplied by Janet McMahon

To make your own colourful Tutti Frutti Bear you will need:

- light brown double knitting yarn
- a choice of colourful oddments of double knitting yarn
- 3mm crochet hook
- Notions – toy stuffing, black embroidery floss.

PATTERN

English crochet terms used - dc (English) = sc (American)

Finished size – approximately 22 cm (8.5 inches) tall.

Body

The body is worked completely in stripes. These can be of widths of 1 or 2 rounds, and with two or three colour changes – the choice is up to you.

With body colour of choice and 3 mm hook make 2 chain.

1st round: 6 dc (US = sc) into 2nd chain from hook. Join with a slip st into 1st dc.

2nd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, [2 dc into next dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

3rd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (18 dc)



4th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 2 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 2 dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (24 dc)

5th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 3 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (30 dc)

6th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 4 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 4 dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (36 dc)

7th – 17th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

18th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 4 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (30 dc)

19th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

20th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (24 dc)

21st round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

22nd round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 2 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (18 dc)

23rd round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

24th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 1 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

25th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

Fasten off and stuff. Do not close the neck opening.



Head

With light brown and 3 mm hook make 2 chain.

1st round: 6 dc into 2nd chain from hook. Join with a slip st into 1st dc.

2nd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next dc] 2 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (9 dc)

3rd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 2 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 2 dc] 2 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

4th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

5th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 3 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 2 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (15 dc)

6th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 2 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 2 dc] 4 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (20 dc)

7th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 3 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 4 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (25 dc)

8th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 4 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 4 dc] 4 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (30 dc)

9th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

10th round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 4 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 4 dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (36 dc)

11th – 13th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

14th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 4 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (30 dc)

15th and 16th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

17th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (24 dc)

18th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

19th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 2 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (18 dc)

20th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 1 dc] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

Stuff head at this point.

21st round: 1 ch, [dc2tog,] 6 times. Sl st into 1st dc. Fasten off and close hole in back of head. Attach to top of body.

Ears

With light brown and 3 mm hook make 2 chain.

1st round: 6 dc into 2nd chain from hook. Join with a slip st into 1st dc.

2nd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, [2 dc into next dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

Fasten off. Sew on to side of head.

Arms

With light brown and 3 mm hook make 2 chain.

1st round: 6 dc into 2nd chain from hook. Join with a slip st into 1st dc.

2nd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, [2 dc into next dc] 5 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

3rd round: 1 ch, 2 dc into same stitch as chain, 1 dc into next 3 dc, [2 dc into next dc, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 2 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (15 dc)

4th – 6th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

7th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 3 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

8th – 12th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc. Fasten off light brown and join in body colour of choice.

13th – 16th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

17th – 18th rounds: sl st into first 3 dc, 1 dc into next 6 dc, sl st into next 3 dc.

Fasten off and stuff. Do not close opening at top of arm.

Attach to body.

Legs

With light brown double knitting and 3mm hook, chain 10.

1st round: 1dc into 2nd chain from hook. 1 dc into next 7 ch, 2dc into last chain.

Working other side of foundation chain, work 2 dc into same place as last dcs. 1 dc into next 7 dc, 3 dc into the same chain as 1st dc worked. Sl st into 1st dc. (22dc)

2nd round: 1ch, 1 dc into same stitch as chain, 1dc into next 8 dc, 2 dc into next 2 dc, 1 dc into next 9 dc, 2 dc into 2 dc. Sl st into 1st dc. (26dc)

3rd and 4th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

5th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into next 7 dc, [dc2tog] 4 times, 1 dc into next 11 dc. Sl st into 1st dc. (22dc)

6th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into next 7 dc, [dc2tog] 2 times, 1 dc into next 11 dc. Sl st into 1st dc. (20dc)

7th round: 1 ch, 1 dc into next 6 dc, [dc2tog] 2 times, 1 dc into next 10 dc. Sl st into 1st dc. (18dc)

8th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 4 dc] 3 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (15 dc)

9th – 12th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

Fasten off light brown and join in body colour of choice.

13th -17th rounds: 1 ch, 1 dc into each stitch to end, sl st into first dc.

18th round: 1 ch, [dc2tog, 1 dc into next 3 dc] 3 times. Sl st into 1st dc. (12 dc)

Fasten off and stuff. Do not close opening at top of leg.

Attach to body.

Using black embroidery floss, embroider a cute little nose and some eyes.
